The book thus offers an integrated perspective on Malaysia by focusing on its natural and human resource endowments and exploring how they have changed over time. By providing the background to essential elements in the evolution of the country's modern economy and society, the book makes an important contribution to a greater understanding of present-day Malaysia.
