

# Pas 'is like a Pak Pandir'

KUALA LUMPUR, Sat. — Datuk Seri Dr Mahathir Mohamad tonight described Pas as the proverbial "Pak Pandir" because the party is giving more than it is receiving from the DAP.

He said Pas fielded 69 candidates while the DAP put up 22 candidates under their secret pact.

"This means that Pas is receiving one for every three it is giving to the DAP. In this respect, Pas is a Pak Pandir," he added when addressing residents of Kampung Kerinci near here.

The Prime Minister is campaigning for the Barisan Nasional candidate for the Damansara Parliamentary constituency, Mr Tan Koon Swan.

Datuk Seri Dr Mahathir said Pas leaders are only interested in winning seats and therefore are prepared to use all means to achieve this.

"Pas will put up candidates in Chinese-majority constituencies just to deny victory to the Barisan Nasional," he said.
