SECURITY MEASURES AT PM'S RESIDENCE ADEQUATE

KUALA LUMPUR, Sept 17 (Bernama) -- Security measures at Sri Perdana, the official residence of Prime Minister Datuk Seri Dr Mahathir Mohamad will be reviewed if there are weaknesses, police said today.

"But, I feel the security measures are adequate," said Kuala Lumpur Deputy CID Chief ACP Abdul Aziz Abdul Hamid said when asked to comment on two intrusions of Sri Perdana.

In the latest incident two days ago, police detained two men after they breached security, driving past the police to the garage.

On Aug 6, an army commando scaled up the slope to the main entrance of the Sri Perdana and told a policeman on duty that he wanted to see the Prime Minister.

Abdul Aziz said both incidents involved deranged persons.

"You just don't know what's in their mind," he said when contacted by Bernama.

He said that if there were to be a review it would only involved overcoming existing weaknesses, nothing major.

Abdul Aziz said the police were still waiting for the doctor's report on the two, the 31-year-old driver and his 21-year-old passenger.

Both are being detained at the Kuala Lumpur Police Contingent Headquarters for further investigations.

"Both claimed to be a managing director with a company in the city. The police are checking their stories," he said.

Dr Mahathir was abroad when the incident took place. He left for Zimbabwe on Sept 12 for the five-day World Solar Summit which began yesterday. -- BERNAMA
