MSC-PRECEDENT
MSC CONCEPT TO BE PRECEDENT FOR OTHERS

CYBERJAYA, July 7 (Bernama) -- Malaysia, through the Multimedia Super Corridor (MSC), has fulfilled the two parameters missing in most Asian countries -- creativity and leadership, says an International Advisory Panel (IAP) member.

Bob Bishop, the chairman of Silicon Graphics World Trade Corporation, told reporters here today Malaysia had already demonstrated more boldness and leadership than other Asian countries through its MSC.

He said the MSC was different compared to other technology established Asian countries such as Singapore, Taiwan, South Korea because these countries had a precedent in Japan, though they did not necessarily use the same formula.

Despite that, he said, these countries were not able to surpass the West in terms of technology because of the two missing parameters.

Once Asian countries can focus on these parameters, including boldness and risk-taking, he said they can surpass the West as they already have the talent and brain power.

In Malaysia, these qualities are already seen in the boldness of Prime Minister Datuk Seri Dr Mahathir Mohamad and the MSC is proof of his vision which, once successful, can be a precedent for others.

He said the strength of the United States is in its creativity, leadership and ability to deal with contradictory opinions. Likewise, the success of Silicon Valley lies in its ability to deal with conflicts, contradictions and ambiguities.

But then, the MSC is not a simple replication of Silicon Valley as the latter was developed 50-60 years ago and is multi-industry in profile.

Bishop said the MSC is an accelerated development process and is being created artificially from a plan, thus its starting point is different from Silicon Valley.

As to the progress on the MSC, he expressed the surprise that the priority and focus in the MSC remained despite the economic crisis.

He said there was real progress in that there were already 228 MSC-status companies comprising a blend of multinationals (MTN) and close to 200 local small and medium scale industries (SMIs).

"If the MSC is filled up with MTNs only, it will fail, but the blend of SMEs and MTNs provide the important balance," he said.

"Things have moved ahead of schedule. The MSC is expected to take us to the future and is the way to pull Asia out of the crisis," he added.

Defying critics on the number of MTNs in the MSC, he said 33 MTNs already add up to a big number.

He also said the things that need more focus by the IAP, which is due to meet tomorrow, are the production of more digital content, e-commerce and having more venture capital funds in competition.

Due attention too, he said, must be given to providing a social environment to the MSC so that it will not become isolated and will have enough committed players.

On the production of digital content, he said Malaysia should develop content based on its own values and culture rather than import them which can lead to a scenario of conflicting values.

He pointed out that there is a deep culture here and this offers an opportunity to bring such values into digital content and transmit them on a world basis.

On SGI, he said the company had been working with many partners indirectly and had in the last 12 months spent RM5-RM6 million in the MSC. Recently, it supplied 150 workstations to the Multimedia University. --
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
