USE STRENGTH FOR MUTUAL BENEFIT, MAHATHIR TELLS MUSLIM NATIONS

DHAKA, March 1 (Bernama) -- Islamic countries must mobilise their assets and intrinsic strength for mutual benefit to triumph in the ever-challenging global arena, Prime Minister Datuk Seri Dr Mahathir Mohamad said here today.

He said: "There are enough skills and intellect in the Muslim world which can be put to good use jointly and help us rebuild our nations to catch up with the rest of the world.

"However, they are now applying their gifts elsewhere because we cannot provide them with facilities they need.

"We have to bring them back, we have to create an environment that is attractive to them and conducive to their work."

The prime minister was addressing the second summit meeting of the group of eight Islamic developing countries (D-8) comprising Bangladesh, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria, Pakistan and Turkey.

The summit was earlier opened by Bangladeshi Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

Among other D-8 leaders present were President Suleyman Demirel of Turkey and Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif of Pakistan.

Set up in Istanbul in June 1997, the D-8 aims at improving economic cooperation through manageable and concrete projects.

Dr Mahathir said with squabbles and political differences dividing the Muslim world, there was really no time for personal ambitions and petty quarrels as Islamic nations were ill-prepared to cope with the threats they faced.

He said that the D-8 was attempting to cope with a world which has become as threatening as when the Muslim empires were under seige.

Calling for greater Islamic unity, he said that Muslim nations must look at the world from the point of view of the ummah as a whole.

"There is only one reason for us to be together, to talk to each other -- and that is because we see benefit in working together and in recognising our mutual responsibility," he said.

Dr Mahathir said that there was a great deal of wealth and potential among Islamic nations but they had not contributed to the well-being or the progress of most of them.

"None of us can claim to be a force of consequence in the international arena today," he said.

He said while the Islamic world were in the 15th century, the rest of the world seemed to be in the 20th century and were now approaching the 21st century and the third millenium.

"In many ways, they seem to be centuries ahead of us and now they have introduced new ideas and technologies which we are not prepared for and we are seemingly unable to handle," Dr Mahathir said.

For instance, he said, the concept about democratic governments have been largely mishandled by Muslim nations which enjoyed the rights conferred but did not seem to recognise that along with the rights came the need for responsibility.

Dr Mahathir also cautioned Islamic countries against the downside of globalisation whereby a country's wealth could be exploited to benefit others but not the country itself.

Another danger was the free flow of capital across borders which gave a free hand to speculators having more money than national governments to

attack currencies with devastating effects, he said.

"They have used our money to invest in our countries and then suddenly pull out their investments in order to destabilise and impoverish us," he said citing Malaysia as a victim of such speculation with its wealth diminished significantly.

"Clearly, we are not adept in the use of our wealth and free flows of capital, a lot of our own money is held hostage abroad and actually used against us," Dr Mahathir said.

He told the summit that attacks on currencies and stock markets were just the beginning.

"We can be assured that newer interpretations of globalisation will be made which will open up newer ways for the exploitation of the poor by the rich," added Dr Mahathir.
