KIT SIANG JUST WANTS TO MAKE HIS PRESENCE FELT, SAYS ZAINUDIN

KUALA LUMPUR, June 12 (Bernama) -- Deputy Information Minister Datuk

Zainudin Maidin said today that the move by opposition leader Lim Kit Siang

to question the declaration of Malaysia as an Islamic state can be regarded

as an attempt to make his presence felt.

"Kit Siang, I believe, has attempted a calculative move to make his

presence felt," he said here.

He said that by pointing a finger at the government, Lim seemed to be

trying to scare the public especially the non-Muslims over such a declaration.

But the fact remains that the people, whether Muslims or non-Muslims,

were now not faced with a situation as painted by Lim as their rights had

not be impinged upon, he said.

Zainudin said that the people were also now feeling more secured than

before the general election.

"As such, the people have inflicted their punishment, reducing the

position of the DAP in parliament and Kit Siang is trying to show that his

presence is even stronger than it actually is," he said.

Zainuddin also reminded Lim that the people now were no longer the same

as when he represented them previously.

"Most of them have the wisdom to see his true colours," he said.

At the Dewan Rakyat sitting on June 8, Lim questioned the declaration

of Malaysia as an Islamic state by former Prime Minister Tun Dr Mahathir

Mohamad in 2001, resulting in a shouting match between him and several

government backbenchers.

Lim has said that based on the constitution and social contract, Malaysia is a secular democratic country with Islam as its official religion and as such cannot be regarded as an Islamic state by any definition or by virtue of any declaration.

Zainudin said that the opposition leader had taken advantage by raising

the Islamic state issue during the debate on the motion of thanks for the

royal address.

"I tried many times to interject but he refused to allow me to...because he had again brought up and disputed the Islamic state declaration," he said.
