MALAYSIA – KENYA BILATERAL RELATIONS

Malaysia enjoys cordial diplomatic relations with Kenya. The establishment of a Trade Office in Kenya by Malaysia in 1965 to oversee trade issues saw the beginning of diplomatic relations between the two countries. These relations were further enhanced by the establishment of the High Commission of Malaysia in Nairobi on 30 September 2005 to promote Malaysia's interest in Kenya. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic a number of visits between the two countries had to be postponed. The use of information technology including video conference has however helped to compensate for the lack of meetings in-person in order to ensure that important bilateral programme continue unhindered.

Malaysia enjoys strong trade ties with East African countries with total trade worth USD 747.10 million in 2019, an increased of 51.1%. Kenya remains as Malaysia's leading trading partner in the region with total trade worth USD 404.4 million in 2019. Exports to other countries continue to register growth albeit at slower pace. Malaysia's major export items to Kenya, and the region include petroleum and chemical products. While major imports include metal ores and scraps.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the role of Malaysian Missions abroad has become even more significant in providing and facilitating assistance to Malaysians overseas. In this context, the High Commission of Malaysia in Nairobi will continue to work with the relevant governments in the repatriation of Malaysians in countries under its purview.

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

On 13 March 2020 Kenya confirmed its first case of COVID-19. The discovery has led the government to spring into action by setting up the necessary containment and treatment protocols across the country. The government also implemented measures to contain the spread of the virus by suspending all travels into and out of the country, closure of all learning institutions, work from home recommendations for businesses and enterprises, usage of cashless transactions, closure of all religious places, postponement of large social gatherings, introduction of night-time curfews, and partial lockdown of counties.

In Malaysia, the government has set up a multi-ministry COVID-19 Task Force as a central coordination unit to contain the virus from affecting Malaysia's interests. Through the Task Force, the High Commission has conducted and facilitated relief efforts to assist Malaysians stranded in countries under its purview. As of 30 June 2020, a total of 42 Malaysians in Kenya, and South Sudan have been successfully repatriated to Malaysia. At present, the High Commission is making efforts to repatriate seven Malaysians in Uganda to Malaysia. Additionally, the High Commission also presented subsistence aids for the stranded Malaysians in Kenya, and Uganda.

This section pays tribute to the relentless efforts by the Government of Malaysia to bring back stranded Malaysians abroad to the country.

MALAYSIA'S DIPLOMATIC EQUIPMENT STOCKPILE (MDES)



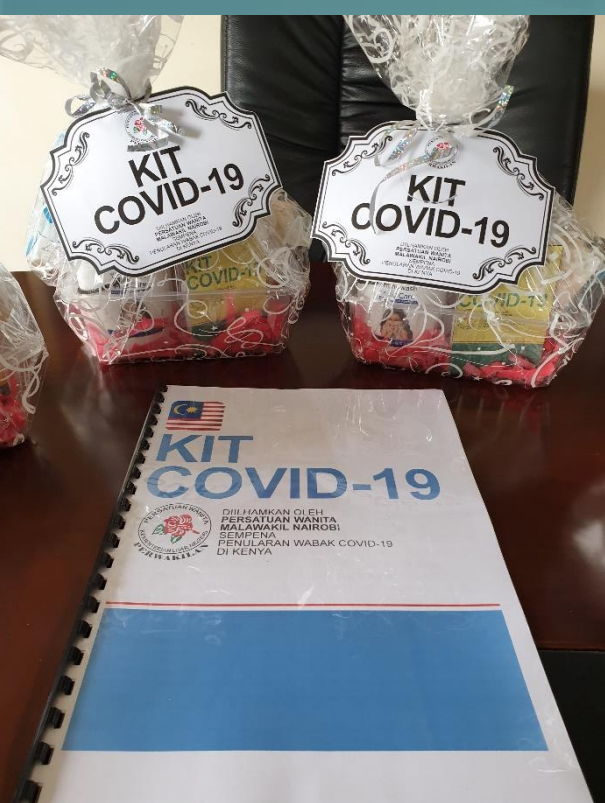
The Malaysia's Diplomatic Equipment Stockpile (MDES) is the brainchild of the Foreign Minister of Malaysia aims to gather and facilitate the channelling of contributions received to all Malaysian missions overseas in times of crises. The stockpile has garnered support consisting of face masks, hand gloves, sanitizers, financial contributions, and others meant for the welfare of Malaysian frontliners stationed in all foreign missions overseas.



The High Commission in Nairobi thanked our foreign minister for the brilliant idea which has further boosted the morale of our frontliners in Nairobi.

PERWAKILAN NAIROBI'S COVID-19 KIT



The Ladies' Association (PERWAKILAN) Nairobi came up with the initiative to create and distribute a COVID-19 Kit. The idea behind the COVID-19 Kit was based on the importance of health awareness in the fight against COVID-19. Each COVID-19 kit consists of travelling size hand sanitizer, hand soap, antibacterial wipes, and a booklet containing the guideline in washing hands with soap, social distancing and the importance of personal hygiene.

The COVID-19 Kit was distributed to all members of PERWAKILAN Nairobi.

MW NAIROBI'S COVID-19 ASSISTANCE TO STRANDED MALAYSIANS IN KENYA



Two Malaysian nationals on business visits were stranded in Kenya since February 2020 after Kenya closed its airport to contain the spread of coronavirus.

With allocation granted by the COVID-19 Task Force, subsistence aids were extended to the two individuals including accommodation allowance.

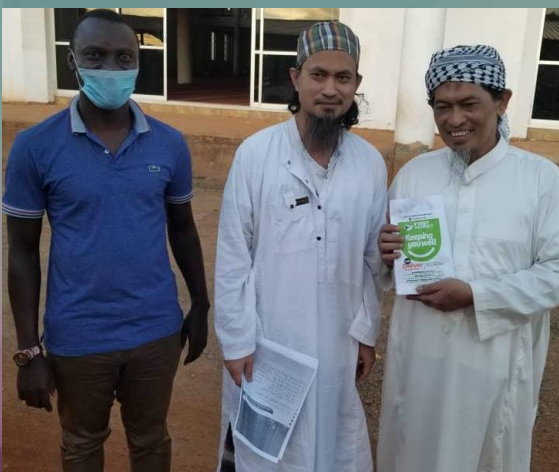
Frequent consular visits were made to the two Malaysians to ensure their safety and wellbeing.

MW NAIROBI'S COVID-19 ASSISTANCE TO STRANDED MALAYSIANS IN UGANDA



In Uganda, eight Malaysians consisting a group of seven *Jemaah Tabligh*, and one individual on a business visit are stranded when the country closed its airport to commercial flights in March to contain COVID-19 pandemic. The High Commission continues to monitor their safety and wellbeing through the assistance of the Honorary Consulate of Malaysia in Kampala.

With allocation granted by the COVID-19 Task Force, subsistence aids were extended to them.



The Malaysian *Jemaah Tabligh* delegation attended a large religious gathering in Kampala, consisting of multi-national delegation from Pakistan and India.

Efforts are underway to repatriate the eight from Uganda.

MW NAIROBI'S COVID-19 EFFORTS

REPATRIATION FLIGHT FOR MALAYSIANS IN SOUTH SUDAN



On 6 April 2020, 36 Malaysians working in South Sudan boarded a chartered repatriation flight facilitated by the High Commission of Malaysia in Nairobi. South Sudan closed its airport for commercial flights in March 2020, at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in the country. The joint effort by PETRONAS and the High Commission for a period of one and a half months resulted in the issuance of a diplomatic approval granted by the Government of South Sudan.

All passengers on board went through a 14-day mandatory quarantine at Sama-Sama Hotel, where all tested negative for COVID-19.

REPATRIATION FLIGHT FOR STRANDED MALAYSIANS IN KENYA



On 24 June 2020, the two Malaysians stranded in Kenya boarded a repatriation flight to return to Malaysia via Istanbul and Doha with the assistance of the High Commission.

They arrived in KLIA on 26 June after transiting for two days in the two cities.

ANC'S CONTRIBUTION TOWARDS KENYA COVID-19 EFFORTS



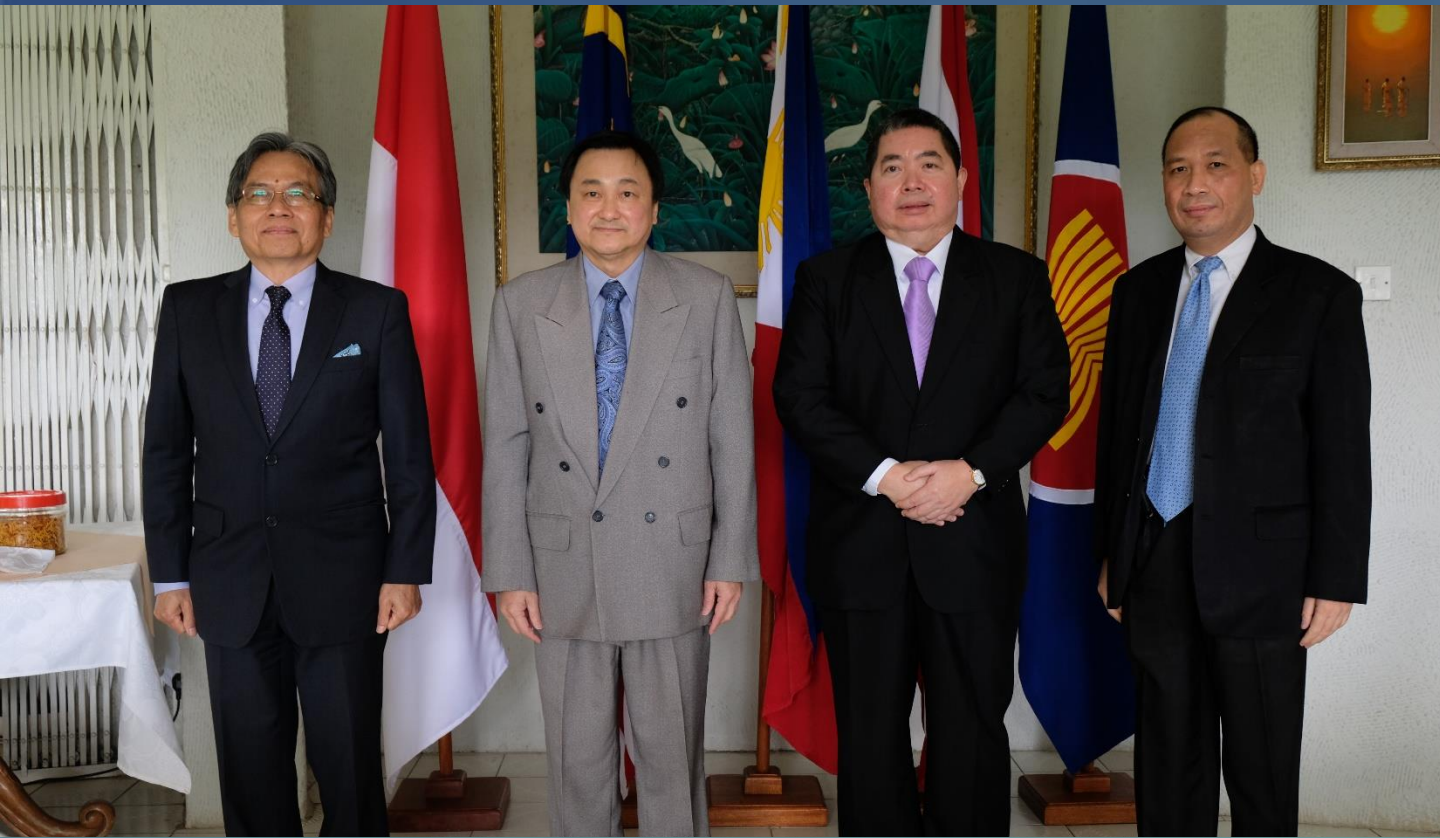
On 5 June 2020, the ASEAN-Nairobi Committee (ANC) handed cash amounting KSH 280,000 to Kenya COVID-19 Emergency Response Fund (ERF). The money is from proceeds of last year's ASEAN-Nairobi Festival. The ERF is a national initiative aimed at assisting Kenya's fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

Additionally, the Foreign Minister of Kenya conducted virtual meetings with the ASEAN Heads of Mission in Nairobi to convey appreciation of the Kenyan government over the initiative.

The ASEAN-Nairobi Committee (ANC) is made up of four (4) ASEAN missions based in Nairobi: Malaysia, Indonesia, the Philippines, and Thailand. The ANC Heads of Mission takes turn to chair the ANC on an annual basis. Malaysia's assumed its chairmanship of ANC in 2018, and will assume the next Chairmanship in 2020.

PROGRAM MENDAMPINGI RAKYAT MALAYSIA (PMRM) CHINESE NEW YEAR CELEBRATION



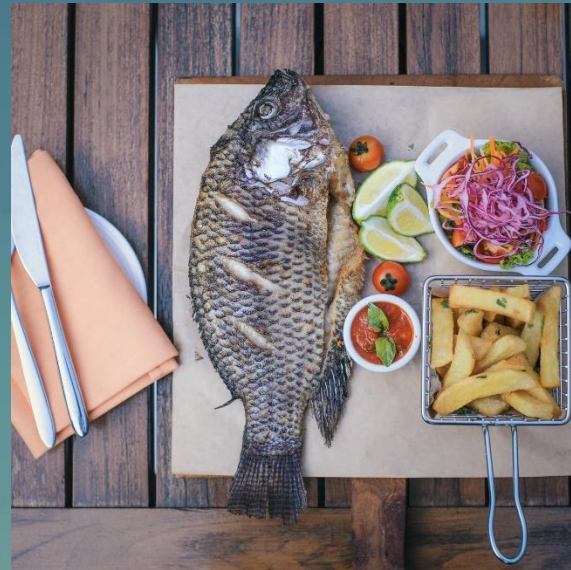

To maximise the visit, the High Commissioner also hosted a dinner with MTCP Alumni/Malaysian residents in Rwanda on 27 February.

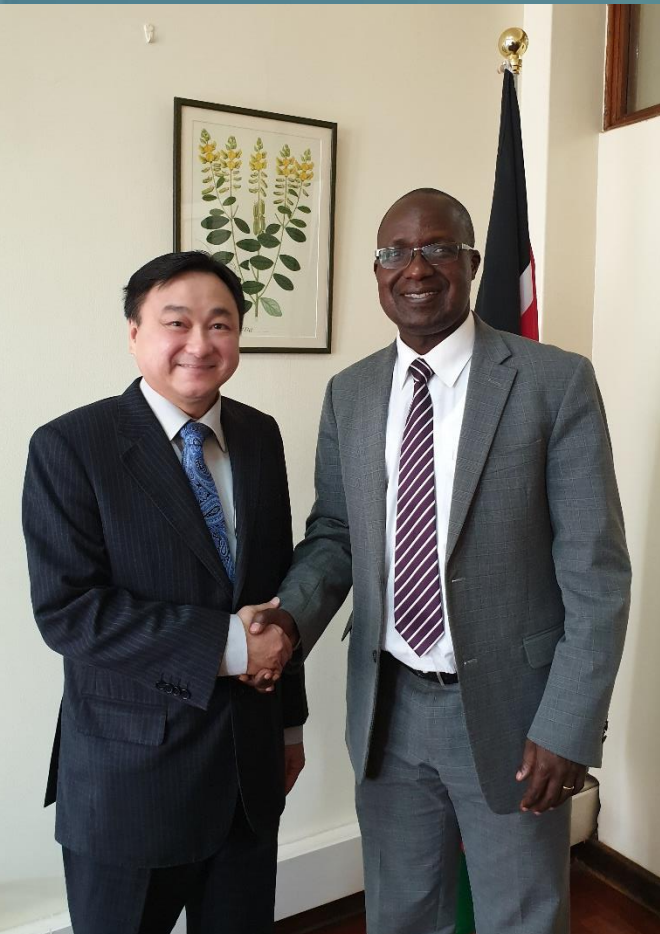

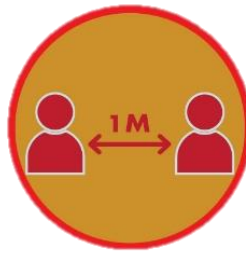

GUIDELINES ENTERING MALAYSIA DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Malaysia has implemented entry and movement restrictions on all foreign nationals in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. On 7 June 2020, the Prime Minister announced the Recovery Movement Control Order (RMCO), in effect from 10 June until 31 August.

Malaysian Entry and Exit Requirements:

Under travel restrictions announced on 16 March and extended several times, all foreign nationals, with very limited exceptions, are restricted from entry to Malaysia until 31 August though this end date may be further extended at the discretion of the Malaysian government. All travelers must have explicit, written permission from the Malaysian authorities prior to traveling to Malaysia. Any travelers permitted to enter Malaysia will be subject to COVID-19 testing and a fourteen-day self-quarantine.

Foreign nationals may transit through the international terminals of Malaysian airports as long as they are not required to pass through immigration while in transit.

Foreign nationals are permitted to depart the country; however flight options are limited. Malaysian citizens with a foreign residence permit are allowed to depart, but will not be able to return until the MCO is lifted. All travelers should be prepared for additional travel restrictions to be put into effect with little or no advance notice.

Additional travel restrictions apply for travel to the East Malaysian states of Sabah and Sarawak, which have local autonomy over immigration at domestic and international ports of entry.

GUIDELINES ENTERING MALAYSIA DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Sabah:

Foreigners may not enter Sabah without prior approval, which must be requested in advance from the office of *Setiausaha Kerajaan Negeri Sabah* at crisis@sabah.gov.my.

Sarawak:

Foreigners with valid visas or work permits who entered Malaysia before the MCO began on 16 March may enter Sarawak without quarantine, but must request advance permission from the Sarawak State Disaster Management Committee (SDMC). Foreigners with valid visas or work permits who entered Malaysia during the MCO will be subject to a mandatory fourteen day quarantine in a government facility at their own expense, and must first request advance permission from SDMC.

Quarantine Information:

Any travelers permitted to enter Malaysia during the MCO will be subject to rapid COVID-19 testing upon arrival. Those who test positive will be transferred directly to a designated government hospital for treatment, while those who test negative will be required to complete a mandatory fourteen-day self-quarantine. As of 10 June 2020, this quarantine may be completed at home rather than in a designated quarantine facility. Travelers will be required to download the MySejahtera application and will be issued a wristband for identification and monitoring by the authorities during their self-quarantine period.

Malaysia has designated specific hospitals in each state to process suspected or confirmed COVID-19 cases. The Ministry of Health of Malaysia has set up a platform to disseminate information on COVID-19 in Malaysia, including a list of designated public hospitals in each state that are equipped to screen for COVID-19.

GUIDELINES ENTERING MALAYSIA DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Entry and Exit Policy for Foreigners During the MCO Period

Foreigners are allowed to leave Malaysia but cannot return to Malaysia during the duration of the MCO.

Special Passes (e.g. dependent passes, employment passes, MM2H, etc.)

Holders of Special Passes which expired between 1 January 2020 and the end of the RMCO (31 August 2020) may depart Malaysia within 14 working days from the date that the RMCO ends with no additional processing required, provided they possess a valid passport. Those wishing to remain in Malaysia must apply to extend their passes within 30 working days after the RMCO ends.

Ninety-day Social Visit Passes

Holders of 90-day social visit passes (tourist visas) which expired between 1 January 2020 and the end of the RMCO (31 August 2020) may depart Malaysia within 14 working days from the date that the RMCO ends, with no additional processing required, provided they possess a valid passport. Malaysian Immigration strongly encourages all social visit pass holders whose passes have expired to depart Malaysia as soon as possible.

Spouses and Children of Malaysian Citizens

Foreign spouses and children of Malaysian citizens may be admitted to Malaysia, on the condition that they can prove the legitimacy of the relationship and they hold a long-term dependent pass.

Expatriate, Skilled Worker, and Knowledge Pass Holders

The Malaysian Immigration Department has issued guidelines on its website for holders of this category and their dependents to request permission to return to Malaysia during the RMCO. Formal written approval from the Malaysian Government must be obtained before attempting to re-enter Malaysia.

GUIDELINES ENTERING MALAYSIA DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Malaysia My Second Home (MM2H) Pass Holders

The Ministry of Tourism, Arts and Culture (MOTAC) has issued guidelines on its website to MM2H members seeking to re-enter Malaysia. The requirements include:

1. registering your details with MOTAC;
2. applying for approval to re-enter Malaysia from the Director General of Immigration Malaysia providing proof upon arrival in Malaysia that you have tested negative for COVID-19 within the 14 days prior to entry; and
3. signing a Letter of Undertaking agreeing to bear the cost for the mandatory 14 days of quarantine upon arrival in Malaysia.

A formal written approval from the Malaysian Government must be obtained before attempting to re-enter Malaysia.

The Malaysian government may implement further changes with little or no advance notice.
