UPHOLD SOVEREIGNTY:

Malaysia's stability is because of the BN government's independence from foreign influence

MALAYSIA is a peaceful country. Well, relatively speaking. If one looks at many of the countries in West Asia, North Africa, Central Africa, Latin America, by comparison with the upheavals there, one must say that Malaysia is a peaceful country.

Even with the release of the film scandalising and insulting Prophet Muhammad did not see the kind of violent demonstrations in Malaysia as in other Muslim countries. The Malaysian Muslims' reaction was relatively mild.

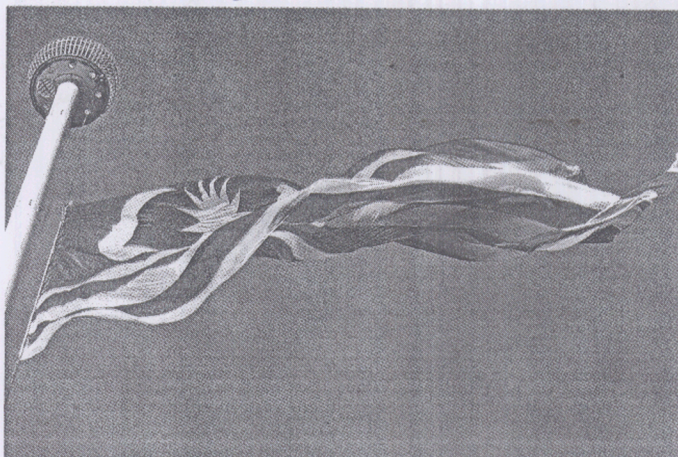

Although the racial differences in Malaysia cause strong disagreements, they are seldom violent. Even the 1969 race riots subsided quickly and the people returned to working and playing together. They do live largely apart but there are no enclaves or ghettos.

Because the country is stable and peaceful it could be developed fairly quickly. Malaysia changed from an agricultural country to an industrialised one without difficulty. The people prospered and enjoy a standard of living comparable with most developed countries.

The coalition of race-based political parties worked well. The people of all races gave strong support to the coalition, which has won elections repeatedly and have governed the country since independence 55 years ago.

Apparently, the West, which used to

rule the country as a colony, is not happy with the peace and stability of Malaysia. Why doesn't Malaysia face the same kind of misgovernment and political instability like other developing countries? Why are the races not fighting each other? Why are there no Muslim extremists killing each other? Why aren't there violent demonstrations? Why doesn't the economy collapse as expected, especially following the currency crisis? Why isn't the government overthrown?

Unhappy with the clear success of Malaysia, the United States, in particular, launched a campaign to destabilise the country. Malaysia must have a regime change so that a government subservient to the US is put in place. Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim was identified as the right candidate to take over.

The effort to achieve regime change failed initially. Support for the BN government remained strong.

The present leader of Malaysia is not unfriendly to the US, but the preference is still for Anwar.

Then US tries not to show its hand. It is known that in Egypt, American non-governmental organisations, financed by US government agencies, were interfering in internal politics.

There are plenty of evidence that the US has been deeply involved in the overthrow of the government of Libya. It is financing and providing arms to

the rebels in Syria.

So is it not surprising that US NGOs and George Soros are financing Malaysians to destabilise Malaysia through wild accusations against the government and its version of democracy. The US and Germany would love to see what happened and is happening in the Arab countries also happen in Malaysia.

The people must be told about how bad the governing party is. They should vote for the opposition and make Anwar the prime minister. If they fail then hold more demonstrations and make them violent like what was seen in Arab countries.

Malaysia must not be allowed to remain stable and prosperous. It must go the way of the other "failed" countries. It must have a change of government and the government must be subservient to the West.
