'Surrender and leave the country'

IRRESPONSIBLE AND UNCIVILISED: We are against group's intrusion, say local Suluk community leaders

TWO local Suluk community leaders have condemned the armed Filipino intruders holed up at Kampung Tanduo, Lahad Datu, for causing unrest and tension in Sabah.

Describing the armed intruders, known as Suluk Tausug from the Tawi-Tawi island in the Southern Philippines, as totally irresponsible for threatening Malaysia's sovereignty, they urged the authorities to take firm action against them.

The Suluk community in Sabah is said to be from the same ethnic group as the Suluk Tausug.

United Sabah Suluk Association chairman Jamal Ali said the Suluk community in the state was against the group's intrusion.

"The group, despite being fellow Muslims, has acted inhumanely against our security forces," he said, adding that the group should surrender and leave the country immediately.

Sabah Suluk Ethnic Association secretary Mohd Zaki Harry Susanto described the intruders as uncivilised.

"The group has no business to create trouble and problems in our country. It should leave our shores immediately as we do not want to see more bloodshed.

"I have relatives in the Philippines, but if they came here illegally, I would tell them off because that would be against our laws."

Zaki said the local Suluks had made their decision to stay in Malaysia.

"My grandfather came here in the 1930s. Since then, this has been our home. I was born here and I am a Malaysian.

"Our people are willing to offer assistance to protect our country from the intruders," Zaki, who was a former policeman, said.

"When I heard news of our men killed in action, I felt like offering my service. I have faith in our security forces and I am sure they are doing their best."
