I asked him about his business and the economy. He said: "*Ini negeri banyak kaya, tapi itu orang politik hari-hari gadoh. Itu Mahathir dia diam-diam la, jangan kacau itu Najib!*" (This is a rich country, but every day the politicians quarrel. Mahathir should be quiet, don't disturb Najib).

Recently, I had chapati in a stall behind Tawakal Hospital in Kuala Lumpur.

I spoke with the owner and asked him about the Goods and Services Tax.

He was not happy with the GST and took pity on the poor and homeless, who were not spared from it.

He did not blame Najib, but said his advisers did not give the right advice and the implementation was done without proper study.

When asked what would be his advice to Najib if he had the opportunity, he said would use the old system of taxing the rich.

By now, the people are getting used to GST. They have to make adjustments and cut out items that are not needed.

In a way, the GST has taught people to be more prudent with their spending.
