In his Wesak Day message, which was posted on his Facebook page yesterday, the prime minister said Buddhism advocated harmony and selAessness.

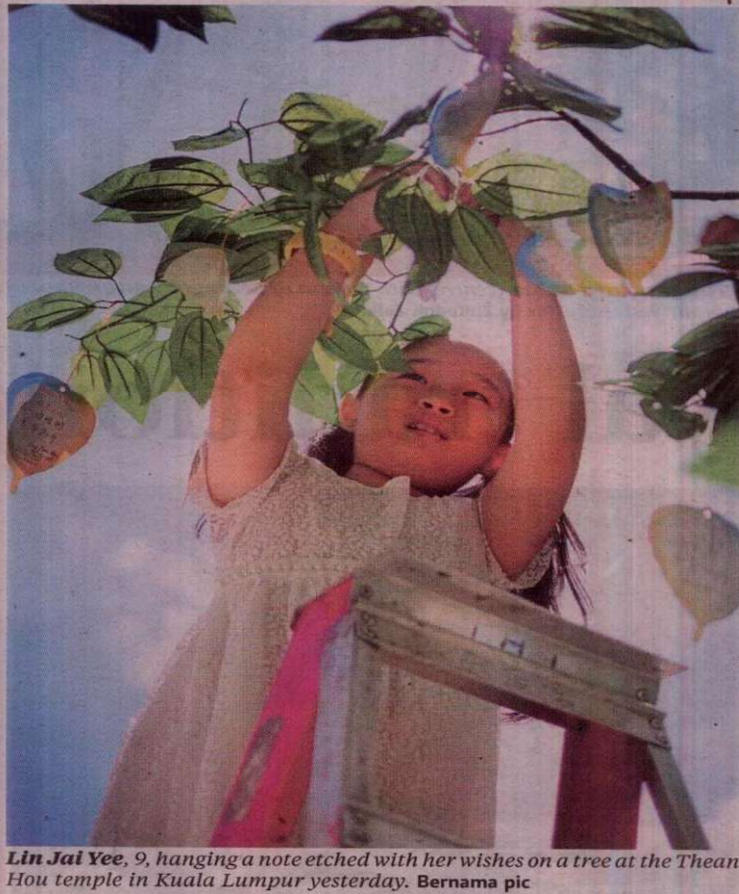
"Buddhism's teachings and the sharing principle are in line with our philosophy of moderation, which we strive to promote and practise in our daily lives in Malaysia."
