

MUHYIDDIN'S KIN SOUGHT BY MACC

Immigration records show ex-PM's son-in-law and a lawyer left country, say graft-busters

THE Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC) is tracking down two men, including the son-in-law of former prime minister Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin.

MACC said the men were wanted to help in investigations into corruption and embezzlement in the registration, recruitment and

storage of foreign workers biometric data at a ministry.

The graft-busters said they had tried contacting the two men, one a businessman and another a lawyer, directly and through their lawyers. However, both have refused to cooperate.

"Checks with the Immigration Department found that both individuals left Malaysia on May 17 and May 21, respectively.

"There is no record of their re-entry into the country.

"The first individual is Muhammad Adlan Berhan, 48. His last known address is Lot 65, Sunway Kiara Hills, Jalan 32/70A Desa Sri Hartamas, here.

"The second individual is Mansoor Saat, 69. His last known address is No. 5, Jalan SS19/1C Subang Jaya, Selangor," MACC said in a statement.

Adnan is Muhyiddin's son-in-law.

In February, it was reported that MACC was investigating a former prime minister and his son-in-law over a lucrative government contract.

MACC sources had said the investigations were focused on possible abuse of power in the awarding of the National Integrated Immigration System (NIIS) contract worth more than RM1 billion to a company linked to the former prime minister's son-in-law.

"MACC is looking at how the contract was given and the company's links to those who were in power at the time," the source said.

There have been suggestions that NIIS, which was being developed to replace the Immigra-

Individu pertama, Muhammad Adlan bin Berhan, 48. mempunyai alamat terakhir di Lot 65, Sunway Kiara Hills, Jalan 32/70A Desa Sri Hartamas, Kuala Lumpur manakala individu kedua, Mansoor bin Saat, 69, beralamat terakhir di 5 Jalan SS19/1C Subang Jaya, Selangor.

Hasil semakan SPRM dengan Jabatan Imigresen Malaysia, kedua-dua penama berkenaan telah meninggalkan Malaysia masing-masing pada 17 Mei dan 21 Mei 2023 serta tiada rekod masuk kembali ke negara ini.

tion Department's foreign workers registration system by 2025, was a "sick project".

Muhyiddin has denied any involvement in the awarding of a lucrative government contract to a company supposedly linked to his son-in-law, describing the al-

legation as a malicious lie.
