

# 'NO MOTION YET AGAINST PM'

## Speaker: No bid to refer Anwar to Parliaments Privileges Committee

**N**O official motion has been submitted to refer Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim to the Dewan Rakyat's Committee of Privileges, said Speaker Tan Sri Johari Abdul.

This follows a statement by the prime minister during a Dewan Rakyat sitting earlier this month, in which he said he had received information that certain opposition MPs were defending the rights of foreigners to benefit from the fuel subsidy rationalisation programme, a remark later directed at Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin.

"No, not yet. The office has yet to receive it," Johari said briefly when asked about the matter after the Community Day Programme at the National Information Dissemination Centre (Nadi) in Ijok.

Present were Health Minister Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad, who is also Kuala Selangor member of parliament (MP), and Ijok assemblyman Jefri Mejan.

It was previously reported that Muhyiddin denied via social media that he had ever made any statement suggesting he was defending the rights of foreigners in the RON95 fuel subsidy rationalisation.

The Pagoh MP also said he

would table a motion in the Dewan Rakyat to refer Anwar to the committee if the latter refused to apologise.

On the event yesterday, Johari said Nadi had grown into an inclusive community hub for society to gain knowledge, enhance skills and improve personal well-being.

He said the centre was no longer merely an Internet hub, but one that catered to students, youths, entrepreneurs, parents and even senior citizens.

"Nadi centres established across the country can serve as effective platforms for raising public awareness about the democratic process.

"They can be used as a ref-

erence point for the School and Youth Parliament programmes, which play a role in training the younger generation in leadership and understanding democracy.

"This effort is also in line with Nadi's role as a community hub for obtaining accurate, reliable and up-to-date information."

Johari added that the programme had also provided the local community in Ijok with opportunities to access information and take part in various activities.

These included Nadi entrepreneurship exhibitions, smart farming demonstrations, membership registration, free health screenings and smart ser-

vices activities open to all age groups.

"The diverse backgrounds present at today's (yesterday) programme demonstrate that Nadi is recognised as an open community centre providing space for learning, healthcare and socioeconomic opportunities for all," he said.

To date, 1,099 Nadi centres have been established nationwide, including 84 in Selangor, with more than 122,653 registered members.

Nadi's impact on local communities was recently recognised at the World Summit on the Information Society Prizes 2025 in Geneva, under the Capacity Building category.
