

**Donald Lim Trashes Out Selangor Housing Issue With Pm

KUALA LUMPUR, April 22 (Bernama) -- Selangor MCA chairman Datuk Donald Lim Siang Chai said today the Barisan Nasional (BN) would make an attempt to resolve as soon as possible the problem of houses close to high-voltage power lines in Rawang.

Without elaborating, he said all the identified problems would be resolved soon and an announcement was expected to be made next week.

He said the issue was one of several discussed by the BN electoral candidates in the Selayang parliamentary constituency with Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Tun Razak who went on a walkabout today in several constituencies in Selangor. Lim is the BN candidate for the Selayang parliamentary seat.

Lim had expressed concern over the risk of electricity supply disruption in Selangor due to the postponement of the installation of the remaining high-voltage cables over a 1.5-km stretch under the Central Area Reinforcement (CAR) project of Tenaga Nasional Berhad in Kampung Sungai Terentang, Rawang, over the past four years.

Lim reportedly said that the project was postponed because of the protests by the people and the PKR-led Selangor government was unable to resolve the problem.

Several villages are affected by the installation of the high-voltage cables along a 60-km stretch between Bukit Tarek in Rawang and Kampung Chubadak in Sentul under the CAR project.

Also joining the prime minister today on the walkabout were the BN candidates for the Kuang state seat (Datuk Abdul Shukur Idrus), the Rawang state seat (Lee Li Yew) and the Taman Templer state seat (Datuk Seri Subahan Kamal).

Subahan told reporters the people of Selangor would have to return the mandate to the BN to ensure that they were well taken care of.

"We find that the low-cost houses have not been built. During the BN administration before, we gave (sold) the houses at RM45,000 but today the price has soared by three times," he said.

He claimed that the Selangor State Development Corporation (PKNS), which was set up to champion the less fortunate, had shifted its focus to purely making profits.
