

AGC denies DPP involved in SRC probe transferred out of MACC

The Attorney-General's Chambers says the senior deputy public prosecutor (DPP) detained by police for allegedly leaking classified information in August is still with the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC).

The AGC in a tweet on its official Twitter account last night denied reports that Ahmad Shazalee Abdul Khairi, the first of several MACC officers arrested by police investigating an alleged leak related to the 1Malaysia Development Berhad (1MDB) special task force investigation, had been transferred out.

"The AGC clarifies that there is no transfer order for DPP out of MACC," read the tweet which was posted late last night.

The tweet was responding to a report by a news portal that Shazalee, who was seconded to MACC, had been ordered to report back to the AGC.

Yesterday, MACC sources also told The Malaysian Insider that there was no such order as Shazalee was [still reporting for duty](#) with the commission.

"He has not received any transfer letter although he is due for promotion. He could remain in MACC after the upgrading exercise," the source said, adding that unverified reports surfacing in the media could affect Shazalee's promotion.

Shazalee was seconded to MACC in 2008 and is meant to serve at the commission until 2017.

He is the only DPP currently with MACC's special operations unit which handles high profile cases, and there are about 30 DPPs seconded to the anti-graft agency from the AGC to assist in investigations and conduct prosecutions.

MACC was investigating former 1MDB subsidiary SRC International over a RM4 billion loan from Retirement Fund Inc (KWAP) to 1MDB and the subsequent transfer of RM42 million into Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Razak's personal bank accounts when the police arrested Shazalee and several others over an alleged leak of information.

The arrests were largely seen as an attempt to thwart the commission's probe. – November 3, 2015.
