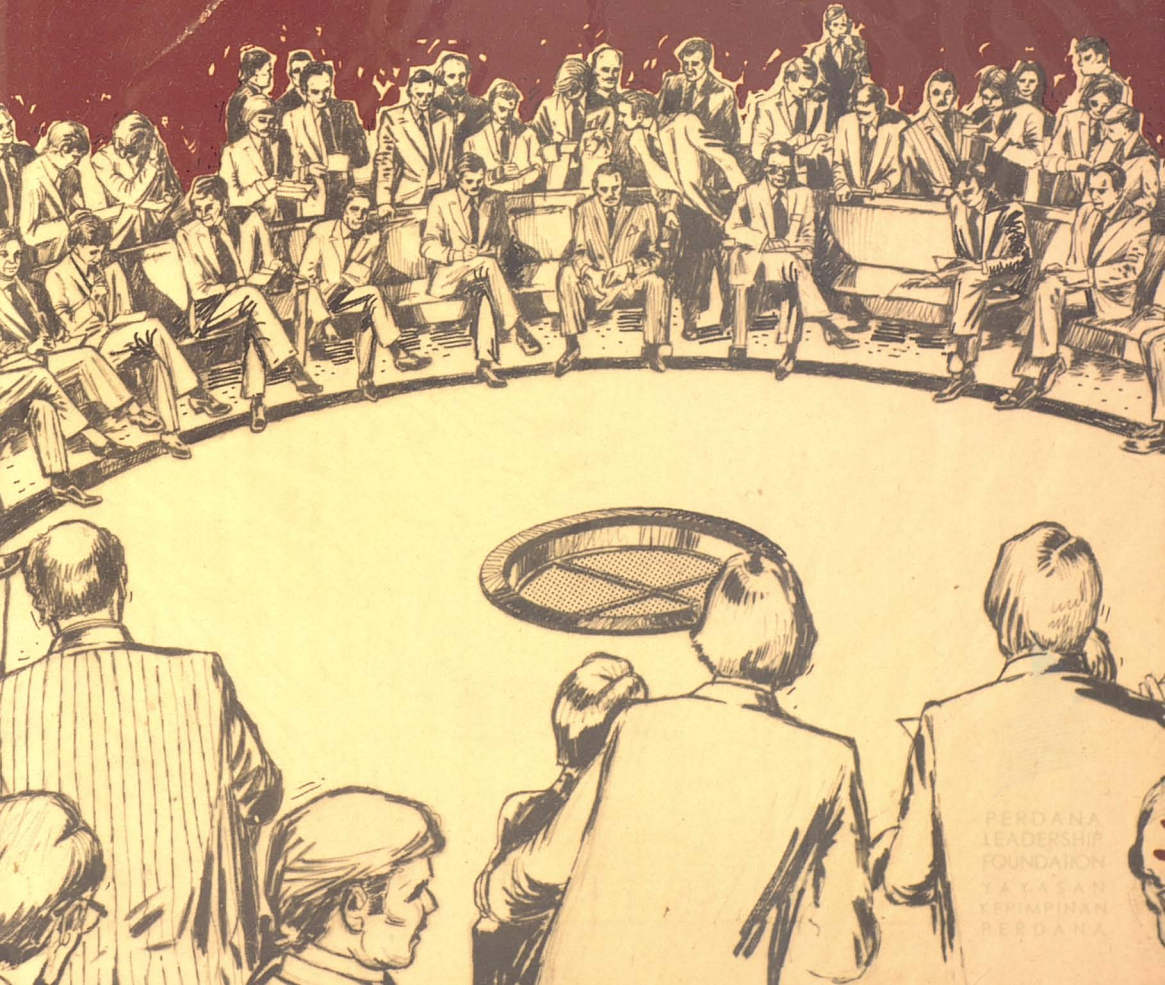

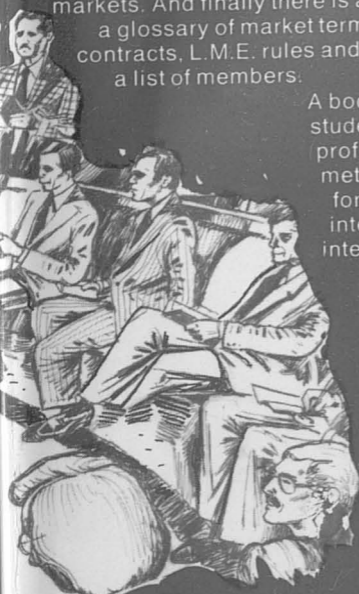

Rudolf Wolff & Co. was founded in London in 1866 by the grandfather of the present Chairman F.F. Wolff. During the 19th century London became the major clearing house for the world's surplus metal. Gradually a metals 'futures' market evolved and in 1877 Rudolf Wolff became one of the group of merchants who formed the London Metal Exchange. Over the years Rudolf Wolff have become one of the leading brokers and Ring dealing members of the London Metal Exchange and members of the company have played a very active role in the organisation and running of the Exchange. More recently the company have become clearing members of the COMEX in New York. In 1971 Rudolf Wolff & Co. went into partnership with Noranda Mines of Canada and the joint company of Rudolf Wolff & Co. Ltd. was formed.
